Workshops will be allocated on first come first serve basis.



## REIMAGINING CLASSICS



A creative and reflective workshop facilitated by Crown of Blood writer,
Oladipo Agboluaje and Deputy Artistic Director of Utopia
Theatre, Mo Korede. Together, we will explore what makes a play a 'classic' and how such works can be reimagined for contemporary audiences.

Through **discussion** and **practical exercises**, participants will use their own personal experiences as a lens to develop bold, relevant interpretations of canonical texts.

Focused on enhancing key critical thinking, literacy and comprehension skills, this workshop is an excellent way to build upon existing knowledge and connect with theatrical literature on a deeper personal level.

**Duration:** 2 hours

### STORYTELLING THROUGH MOVEMENT

Led by **Deputy Artistic Director** of **Utopia Theatre**, **Mo Korede**, this Utopia Theatre workshop explores how music, movement and choreography can shape narratives and characters.

Participants will learn how to integrate **physical** and **auditory storytelling** into scenes in meaningful and expressive ways. Using a range of culturally relevant **instruments** and **movent techniques** from the world of Crown of Blood, students will take this forward to create something new of their own.

## FACILITATOR BIOGRAPHIES



### **OLADIPO AGBOLUAJE**

Writer of Crown of Blood

Oladipo Agboluaje is a playwright and academic. His first play Early Morning was produced in 2003 at **Oval House Theatre** in South London; followed by a string of original plays, adaptations and radio plays including God is a DJ, The Hounding of David Oluwale and **New Nigerians**. His first collection of plays, **Plays One**, was published by Oberon in 2014. He is the 2009 winner of the Alfred Fagon prize for playwriting for his play Iya-Ile (The First Wife), which was also nominated for an Olivier Award. Agboluaje's writing deals with identity and belonging, and the African Diasporic condition. He is a frequent adaptor.



### **MO KOREDE**

Deputy Artistic Director of Utopia Theatre

**Mo Korede** is a Black British/ Nigerian director, theatre-maker, and writer with a bold vision. His work interrogates identity, heritage, and power through a poetic and politically charged lens. With over nine years of professional directing experience, Mo has staged critically acclaimed productions at venues including Theatre Peckham, Theatro Technis, and the Lyric Hammersmith- most notably Cleopatra's Antony (2024), **OUR FATHER** (2023), and **Elektra** (2022).

## **SPACE AND TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS**

Ideal Space:

A drama studio, hall, or flexible performance space with room for physical movement. Minimum Requirement:

A cleared classroom or similar space where participants can move safely.

• Equipment:

A sound system for playing music is beneficial for the movement workshop. All other materials are provided.
